• Greenville County is about 800 square miles and has a population of @ 450,000 people.

 We are the largest animal shelter in the State of South Carolina and one of the largest capacity shelters in the US with 250 cat cages and over 300 dog cages and kennels.


• Historically, we are known to take in 20,000+ animals annually.

 Our animal shelter serves not just Greenville County but also our animal neighbors, Spartanburg County. Historically, that added 5,000 animals to our intake totals.



# TO SUPPORT A FREE ROAMING CAT PROGRAM IN GREENVILLE COUNTY TO IMPLEMENT THE TRAP, NEUTER, AND RETURN METHOD AS AN EFFECTIVE WAY TO DEAL WITH STRAY AND FERAL CATS


WHEREAS, Greenville County Council finds that free roaming cats threaten the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Greenville County, and

WHEREAS, Greenville County Council further finds that free roaming cats increase the number of strays and contribute to animal overpopulation, and

WHEREAS, Greenville County Council seeks to reduce the feral and stray cat population by authorizing the implementation of a Free Roaming Cat Program ("Program"), and

WHEREAS, the Program would implement the Trap, Neuter, and Return ("TNR") method as a humane way to deal with cat overpopulation, and





### MANAGING INTAKE


### Previously:

- Open 42 hours / week for stray intake, including Saturdays
- •Surrenders accepted anytime we were open.

### Now:

- Open 20 hours / week for stray intake- no intake on weekends
- •Surrenders by appointment- only 16 appointments available per week





### **Leave Litters Alone!**



### **CATS**

- 3,421 fewer cats taken in
  - (~40% decrease in one year!)
- 2,626 fewer cats euthanized
  - (~60% decrease in one year!)

### DOGS

Dog Intake	7,598	Dog Intake	6,075
Euthanasia	1,344	Euthanasia	599


- 1,523 fewer dogs taken in
  - (~20% decrease in one year!)
- 745 fewer dogs euthanized
  - (~55% decrease in one year!)



### NO KILL SOUTH CAROLINA

- In 2016, Greenville County Animal Care became a Key Resource Center for the No Kill South Carolina grassroots plan.
  - Help under-performing shelters improve animal care
  - Share life-saving strategies
  - Mentor and teach other shelters
  - Together become the first No Kill Community in the Southeast.
